

YEAR IN REVIEW

2022 was an inspiring year for our game as Football Queensland continued to transform football in Queensland, with almost 78,000 games played throughout the statewide connected football pyramid.

Following two years of unprecedented interruptions due to the ongoing impacts of COVID-19, our game was faced with another significant challenge this year as the major flood event in February impacted over 100 Queensland clubs. Football Queensland also felt the direct impact of this as our Meakin Park headquarters were submerged.

Following the major flood event, FQ launched a dedicated Flood Support Hub to connect clubs affected with support from the wider football community.

A significant portion of 2022 was spent implementing the Future of Football 2020+ competition reforms, as Football Queensland reinforced the connected football pyramid introduced in 2021 to connect competitions and strengthen pathways for clubs and participants across the state.

In line with this and in an exciting addition for our regional clubs, FQ launched the FQPL Champions League in 2022. The FQPL Champions League was designed to provide brand new opportunities for aspirational players as they competed against the best of the best not only within their conference but also from the rest of the state. The inaugural edition of the FQPL Champions League was extremely successful and proved to be a fantastic addition to the 2022 competition calendar as it brought

together the best teams from across the Northern, Central and South East Queensland conferences.

Tournament football in Queensland achieved participation highs in 2022 as 88 teams participated in the FQ Futsal State Titles, 137 sides entered the Australia Cup and 67 teams competed in our Kappa Women's Super Cup competition.

Maroochydore FC again played host to Queensland's largest football carnival in July 2022, with FQ partnering with Sunshine Coast Council and Visit Sunshine Coast to welcome over 100 teams to the region for WinterFest while just two months later we were delighted to deliver another major state event on the Sunshine Coast, the FQ Community Cup.

On the national stage meanwhile, our state recorded one of our most successful years ever following the rollout of the integrated statewide FQ Academy, with Queensland state teams dominating at national tournaments including the National Youth Championships and NTC Challenge thanks to a 'One Queensland' approach to state team selection.

The Queensland squads featured both regional and metro FQ Academy players, with the talent of young Queenslanders on full display as our state teams went undefeated in over 70% of games and brought home two trophies. Just weeks later, our Under 18 girls squad won all six of their matches at the NTC Challenge in an incredible clean sweep for the state.

Football Queensland's ongoing focus on strengthening coach development opportunities resulted in a record number of coach development courses and workshops being delivered across the nine regions in 2022 as Queensland continued to record an increase in registered coaches.

Referee participation numbers in Queensland also continued to surge in 2022 with an increase in total registrations and registered female referees as Football Queensland announced further investment in referee development with the appointment of new roles in every region across the state.

2022 saw massive achievements in FQ's digital broadcast reach with total unique viewers

increasing by 113% as more than 820,000 viewers tuned in to the FQTV Match Centre. There was especially strong growth in our women's game with viewership of the NPL Women's competition increasing by 171% and our Kappa Women's Super Cup hitting a record 287% growth in viewers.

After proudly delivering on the objectives of the 2020 – 2022 strategic planning period with unparalleled growth in every part of the state over the last three years, Football Queensland was excited to unveil the 2023 – 2026 One Football Strategic Plan for football in Queensland this year. Designed to meet the targets and ambitions of a united, national strategy for the game as we look ahead to the next four years, this strategy focuses on the four pillars of Participants & Clubs, Elite Teams & Pathways, Fans, and Unifying Football.

With a focus on reaching 50/50 gender parity across all sectors of the game in line with the state and national target, FQ launched the Be23Ready initiative with the goal to equip clubs with tools to create more inclusive and welcoming environments for female participants. As part of this initiative, over 100 club-based Women and Girl Ambassadors were appointed to drive widespread participation and club development improvements to deliver a game-changing legacy in our state following the arrival of the biggest global women's sporting event, the FIFA Women's World Cup 2023™.

From the dedicated staff at Football Queensland, to our valued partners who make every season possible, I'd like to extend a warm thank you for



continuing to support our football community across the state.

I'd also like to take the opportunity to thank all members of our football family for continuing to be resilient and facing every challenge that comes our way; I hope to cross paths with many of you as I embark on my final months in the role of Football Queensland President.

As we look ahead to 2023, let's prepare to share our Queensland spirit and put our beautiful game on show to the world as it arrives on our doorstep for the FIFA Women's World Cup 2023^{TM} .

Female Football Week

FQ's Female Football Week focused on three key pillars of #OurGame – Build, Enhance and Celebrate. As part of the celebrations, FQ highlighted the heroes across the state who have gone above and beyond for the women's game while highlighting the events and activations happening at clubs across the state.



Girls United

Following the success of the inaugural Girls United Carnival in 2021, FQ welcomed more than 20 teams from the Central Coast, Wide Bay and Sunshine Coast regions to Gladstone for the 2022 event. Norbridge Park in Rockhampton also played host to a Girls United weekly social football program as FQ continued to deliver more flexible and inclusive participation opportunities for women and girls.



Our Game Network

The Our Game Network – Queensland was launched during FQ's Super September and is designed to bring together passionate members of the women's game and clubs across the state to collaborate, network and share successes and challenges as we work together to build more inclusive environments for female participants in the lead-up to the FIFA Women's World Cup 2023™ and beyond.

A total of 38,876 young boys and girls participated in MiniRoos programs across Queensland in 2022, with 7.6% growth recorded in female MiniRoos registrations compared to 2021.

FQ Academy Holiday Clinics

Football Queensland was excited to launch the FQ Academy Holiday Clinics in 2022, hosting sessions for over 3,000 young footballers across the state during the Easter, Winter, September and Christmas holidays. A total of 60 FQ Academy Holiday Clinics were delivered across every region in Queensland, providing junior players with new opportunities to be part of Australian football's official development pathway while developing functional game skills in a fun, engaging environment.

MiniRoos Kick-Off After School Programs

FQ partnered with Brisbane Roar and local clubs to deliver MiniRoos Kick-Off After School programs for girls in 2022. The initiative focused on engaging girls enrolled in Prep to Year 3 in the MiniRoos program, developing their love for football and supporting their transition from school to club football.

Sporting Schools

Football Queensland partnered with Sport Australia to deliver Sporting Schools programs to 24,209 participants across the state in 2022.

FQ Futsal State Titles

A record number of teams from across Queensland participated in the 2022 FQ Futsal State Titles, held in September at the Nissan Arena in Brisbane. The State Titles provided an opportunity for teams from across Queensland to come together to compete to become champions within their age group, and the overall champion club.



FQ Futsal Club Championship

Sunshine Coast Wave secured the inaugural FQ Futsal Club Championship in 2022, with points awarded across FQ's major futsal tournaments and leagues including the Futsal State Titles, the F-League and the SEQ Futsal Premier League.





INCLUSIVE



Walking Football

Football Queensland delivered a range of Walking Football carnivals and events throughout 2022 including the annual QUT Cup which featured over 160 participants and the 12-hour Walking Football marathon at Club Oxley. FQ was also proud to deliver Walking Football at the Pan Pacific demonstrated FQ's commitment to developing Masters Games for the first time in 2022, with 250 participants and 30 teams from around the country taking part across four competition groups.

Q-League

The 2022 Q-League featured 16 teams across two competition groups as FQ continued to bring together communities and players of all backgrounds while providing a pathway to structured club football. Italian Generation Calcio and Brisbane United FC were crowned Q-League Premiers before ONZ FC and Umoja FC secured Grand Final victories.

National Para Football Championships

12 Queenslanders represented the state at the 2022 National Para Football Championships on the Gold Coast as a Football Queensland state team competed in the tournament for the first time in six years.

Beach Soccer

In January 2022 FQ staged a first-of-its kind Beach Soccer event at Coolangatta Beach in partnership with Major Events Gold Coast. The event featured Men's and Women's teams from across South East Queensland and New South Wales and new products and formats to create more opportunities for all Queenslanders to get involved in the game.



REFEREES

Protect Our Game

In April FQ launched the Protect Our Game initiative, designed to promote a positive environment and supportive behaviours within football in Queensland by taking steps to eliminate poor behaviour both on and off the field. Three key elements underpinned the campaign; education, awareness and ownership as FQ developed Laws of the Game based content to further educate the football community, launched a statewide Protect Our Game round and introduced a three-strike policy to combat referee abuse.



Growth in Female Referees

Referee numbers across Queensland continued to grow in 2022, with FQ's ongoing commitment to referee education and development resulting in a 38% increase in registered female referees as FQ delivered courses to over 2,000 participants around the state.

Referee Development

In line with FQ's commitment to growing the number of referees within our game, 25 referee staff were appointed across each of the nine regions in Referee Coach and Development, Support, Mentoring and Training roles to strengthen the development of match officials in Queensland.

FQ's ongoing commitment to referee education and development continued in 2022 despite the impacts of the floods, with FQ delivering courses to over 600 participants across every region.

FQ Coaches Club

In May, Football Queensland launched the FQ Coaches Club pilot program across South East Queensland, designed to provide additional support and development opportunities for community coaches. The FQ Coaches Club gave coaches, Club Coach Coordinators and those who had recently completed a C Diploma a space to gain extra advice and support through attendance at one of six sessions, with a key focus on session design and delivery in an informal workshop format.

Female-Only Coaching Courses

Football Queensland hosted the state's first female-only Football Australia/AFC C Diploma course since 2018 as part of an ongoing commitment to strengthening development opportunities for female coaches. Australia's first ever female-only B Diploma which was hosted by Football Queensland also wrapped up in 2022 as participants took the next step in their coaching career.





Coaching Courses

Despite the floods providing some disruption to the delivery of courses in parts of the state throughout 2022, FQ still reached high participation rates while continuing to provide educational opportunities to Queensland coaches.

CLUB SUPPORT



Flood Support Hub

Following the state's major flood event in February, Football Queensland launched a dedicated Flood Support Hub to connect impacted clubs with support from the wider football community. Over 100 Queensland clubs were devastated, fields were inundated with water, and changerooms, clubhouses, machinery and field lighting heavily damaged by the floods. Those not directly impacted by floodwater were also affected as fixtures were postponed at every level of the game, while Football Queensland felt the personal impact of the flood event as the Meakin Park headquarters were submerged. The Flood Support Hub housed on Football Queensland's Club Support Hub provided a go-to place for clubs to seek support from the community as they commenced their clean-up and recovery efforts.

Club Guides

Throughout 2022, FQ continued to release a range of guides designed to provide additional support and guidance to clubs across a variety of specific areas. Housed on the Club Support Hub, club guides released in 2022 included: the First Aid Guide, the Club Referee Guide, and the Goal Post Guide.



TECHNICAL DEVELOPMENT

FQ Academy Carnivals

12 FQ Academy Carnivals were held across the Metro, Sunshine Coast, Central Coast, Wide Bay, Whitsunday Coast, Northern and Far North & Golf regions in 2022, bringing together young male and female players from across the FQ Academy who gained valuable experience coming up against their peers from across the state.

FQ Academy U12 Cup

Football Queensland delivered the first ever FQ Academy Under 12 Cup in September, providing a new competitive tournament for FQ Academy players across the state. Over 3,000 players, spectators and supporters came together in the Sunshine Coast region to watch teams from across the five FQ Academy regional centres compete alongside NPL Junior sides.

WinterFest

Held in partnership with Sunshine Coast Council and Visit Sunshine Coast, FQ's largest junior football event, WinterFest, was held in July. The second edition of the carnival saw more than 6,000 attendees and over 100 teams head to the Sunshine Coast for the five-day exhibition of football. Bringing together participants and families from across the state, the carnival welcomed young players from across South East Queensland and from regional FQ Academy programs in North and Far North Queensland, Mackay, Central Queensland and Wide Bay.

FQ Community Cup

The 2022 FQ Community Cup was held in September, with the annual tournament delivered in partnership with Sunshine Coast Council and Visit Sunshine Coast and bringing together over 2,750 members of the football community.

Tier 2 Club Assessment

A new Tier 2 level of quality assurance was introduced to Football Queensland's club assessment process in 2022 for clubs in the FQ Academy League 3 or 4. The Tier 2 assessment is also offered to regional clubs with FQPL status and proven commitment to youth development.

Launch of the FQ Academy

2022 saw the rollout of the FQ Academy across the state, expanding and unifying FQ's range of advanced development and pathway programs under a single banner to provide a clearer pathway from community football to Australia's national teams. In November, FQ announced the expansion of the FQ Academy with the appointment of Dale Hill to head up the FQ Goalkeeper Academy in the state's inaugural full-time goalkeeper development role.

Pathway to National Teams

Queenslanders made their mark on the international stage in 2022 as FQ Academy QAS players Daisy Brown, Jonti Fisher, Charlie Gibson and Ella O'Grady made their national team debuts with the CommBank Junior Matildas at the AFF U18 Women's Championships in Indonesia. Led by Queensland's very own Rae Dower, the Australian side were crowned AFF U18 Women's Champions after a fantastic campaign featuring a number of goals from the young Queensland players.

Football Queensland technical staff also gained valuable experience working with national teams throughout November in a number of technical, coaching and support roles for tournaments including the FIFA World Cup Qatar 2022™ and the Pacific Women's Four Nations tournament.



Queensland Success on National Stage

Queensland recorded one of the state's most successful years ever on the national stage thanks to a 'One Queensland' approach to state team selection as representative sides featuring regional and metro FQ Academy players dominated at the 2022 National Youth Championships and the National Training Centre Challenge.

The talent of young Queenslanders was on full display as four state sides reached the National Youth Championships Final, with the Under 14 Boys and Under 16 Girls crowned NYC Champions.

Queensland's Under 18 Girls squad competed in the NTC Challenge just weeks later, winning all six of their matches and further demonstrating the state's impressive track record at national tournaments.



COMPETITIONS







NPL Queensland

The 2022 NPL Women's season saw Lions FC defend their title, securing the Premiership-Championship double for a second consecutive year. Lions FC also claimed the Premiership in the NPL Men's competition before Gold Coast Knights defeated Olympic FC in the 2022 Grand Final.



The 2022 FQPL 1 Women's season saw Peninsula Power crowned Premiers with a 19-game undefeated run, earning them promotion to the NPL Queensland for 2023. Fellow promoted side Mitchelton FC claimed a stunning extra time Grand Final victory, handing the Premiers their only defeat of the year to secure the FQPL 1 Women's Championship. In the FQPL 1 Men's competition, Redlands United secured the 2022 Premiership-Championship double to earn promotion to the NPL Queensland alongside top two side Rochedale Rovers.

FQPL 2 Men's side Surfers Paradise Apollo secured promotion to the FQPL 1 in style, claiming the Premiership in their undefeated season before going on to win the Grand Final. In the FQPL 2 Women's, Robina City claimed the Premiership-Championship double as they booked their place in the FQPL 1 competition for 2023 with an undefeated record.

Launch of Regional FQPL Structure

The new football pyramid delivered connected competitions from the NPL Queensland to the FQPL 6 in 2022 through promotion and relegation. The FQPL structure was also launched throughout regional Queensland this year with the creation of the Northern Conference, the Central Conference and the South East Queensland Conference, connecting clubs and participants from the regions to the FQPL framework.













FQPL Champions League

Football Queensland was proud to launch the FQPL Champions League in 2022 as the new tournament brought together the best teams from across the Northern, Central and SEQ conferences. Following the implementation of the connected football pyramid, the FQPL Champions League provided brand new opportunities for aspirational players and clubs throughout the regions. Regional Final winners Edge Hill United took on FQPL 1 Premiers Redlands United in the first ever FQPL Champions League Final, with Redlands United crowned the inaugural FQPL Champions League winners.



F-League

In an amazing achievement in their first season in the league, Sunshine Coast Wave secured the F-League Men's Premiership-Championship double. Crusaders FC again dominated in the F-League Women's competition in 2022, claiming both the Premiership and Championship for the second consecutive year.



Australia Cup


The 2022 Australia Cup saw 137 Queensland sides enter the state's preliminary rounds, with Peninsula Power, Brisbane City, Logan Lightning and Magpies Crusaders advancing to the Round of 32 alongside Brisbane Roar. In the nail-biting national stage of the competition, NPL Queensland side Peninsula Power made it all the way to the Quarter Finals while Brisbane Roar bowed out with a Semi Final defeat.



Kappa Women's Super Cup

The second edition of the Kappa Women's Super Cup saw a record 68 teams compete in the statewide women's knockout tournament before Lions FC were crowned Champions for the second consecutive year.

Partnerships

FQ renewed eight of its partnerships in 2022 as commercial revenue grew to \$1,005,596. Thank you to each of our valued partners for your continued support of our beautiful game here in Queensland.

Digital Engagement

Football Queensland recorded strong levels of digital engagement and reach across all platforms in 2022, including substantial growth in website page views and email database subscriptions.

Growth in Digital Broadcast Reach

2022 was another hugely successful year of growth in Football Queensland's digital broadcast reach as more than 820,000 unique viewers tuned in to the FQTV Match Centre launched this year.

Total unique viewers increased by 113% in 2022, demonstrating the huge level of interest and appetite for Queensland football content while there was particularly strong growth in the women's game in 2022 as viewership of the NPL Women's competition increased by 171% and the Kappa Women's Super Cup recorded an incredible 287% growth in viewers.

With the connected football pyramid implemented in 2022 as part of the Future of Football 2020+ competition reforms, Football Queensland also expanded its regional coverage and brought more live matches to fans statewide as all 26 FQPL Grand Finals were broadcast across each region alongside a total of 16 regional Australia Cup and Kappa Women's Super Cup matches.

FOOTBALL IN QUEENSLAND AWARDS NIGHT

The 2022 Football in Queensland Awards Night was held on Friday, 28 October at Brisbane City Hall, celebrating the achievements of the state's best players, coaches, referees, volunteers and teams from grassroots to the NPL Queensland.

Service to Football

FIVE-YEAR FINANCIAL OVERVIEW

The 2022 Financial Statements presented below highlight the overwhelmingly positive impact of the reforms Football Queensland implemented to become the single point of accountability responsible for administering Football Australia affiliated competitions within Queensland.

This complex period of change, which was additionally challenging due to the flooding of the Meakin Park headquarters, was navigated with prudent financial management practices to position the organisation with strong cash and net asset balances to enable future investment in the growth and development of the game we love in this state.


Across the five-year period from 2018 to 2022, Football Queensland has actively sought to diversify the revenue streams flowing into the organisation by targeting growth in our commercial partnerships income to reduce reliance on registration income and build a more robust business capable of leading the game forward. This allowed FQ to keep registration fees unchanged and will continue to place downward pressure on fees.











FINANCIAL OVERVIEW

The concise financial report has been derived from the full financial report of Football Queensland (FQ) for the financial year ended 31 December 2022. It does not provide as full an understanding of the financial performance as the full financial report.

2022 marked the ninth consecutive surplus for Football Queensland. The surplus for the financial year ended 31 December 2022 amounted to \$1,115,078 (2021: surplus of \$395,479).

The 2022 financial report includes expenses incurred from a significant flooding event at Football Queensland's Meakin Park headquarters in February 2022. Insurance claim compensation of \$307,000 recently finalised and lodged has not been recognised in FY 2022 against these expenses, as under accounting standards income cannot be booked until the claim is approved by the Insurer. The Directors are confident that the claim will be successful and paid.
